The Grand Master's Message

reemasonry is an order dedicated to promoting the principles of tolerance, equality and respect. We practice amongst ourselves and encourage others to practice the acceptance of all men and women regardless of race, religion and nationality. For those of us raised in the liberal traditions of Canada, it can seem as if these ideals are almost motherhood. They are generally accepted and there is little public opposition to these beliefs. The racism and intolerance in our society tends to be subtle, although it still can be devastating, as some of our First Nations people can testify.

However, November 11, Remembrance Day, tells us a different story. It reminds us that hatred, bigotry and violence have always been and continue to be a tragic but powerful element in the human condition. This is a day set aside to remember those men and women who made the supreme sacrifice to protect the principles of democracy and freedom, and to whom we should be eternally grateful.

But is also a day for us to reflect on our own obligations. We must not be complacent in the defense of our principles.

November 11 is the day when we are reminded, with stark and unmistakable clarity, the horrific price that must be paid when power rests in the hands of the fanatics of nationalism, racism, or religious fundamentalism.

We live in a time of sweeping social change and great cultural upheaval. In such times some people embrace the challenges and opportunities presented and strive to create a better world. Others retreat into traditional certainties, taking refuge in the culture and belief systems of the past. This is the soil of religious fundamentalism, and it becomes more virulent as the pace of change accelerates. And as we all know, Freemasonry is one of the favourite targets of fundamentalists and bigots of all types.

We must not cower or shirk our responsibilities in the face of this opposition. And we must not fall into the easy racist stereotypes of seeing the opposition as simply Arab or Islamic terrorists. There has been one act of international terrorism in Manitoba in recent years - a local doctor shot and wounded while sitting in his home - shot by an American, a so called Christian fundamentalist. And Freemasonry is still condemned, along with its beliefs in religious tolerance, from some of the pulpits of churches in our own towns and neighbourhoods.

In the midst of the laughter, the fellowship and the fun that we cherish so much, there is also a serious side to Freemasonry. November 11 is a day for remembrance. It is also a day for resolve. Speak often and speak proudly of what our order represents - the world needs to hear our voice. And do not cower before the opposition of others. The consequences we might face, the sacrifices we might be asked to make for defending these principles - do they seem that great when you reflect on the poppy on your lapel?

In closing, I want to extend the good wishes of all of the officers of the Grand Lodge to our Muslim brethren as they celebrate the month of Ramadan.


